






# Speed

#### Salient and persisting problem


- A small change in speed has a large change in stopping distance
- Poor understanding of risk of speed and impact on crash outcomes

## Speed vs Injury

Probability of fatal injury as a function of collision speed

## **Distraction**

#### Equal to driving under the influence with a BAC >0.05

- Primary focus on mobile phones, can also be talking to passengers, reaching for objects, using GPS/Maps, eating & drinking.
- In 2020, distraction was a factor in 23 deaths and 25 serious injuries



"Drivers using mobile phones are approximately 4 times more likely to be involved in a crash than drivers not using a mobile phone. Using a phone while driving slows reaction times (notably braking reaction time, but also reaction to traffic signals), and makes it difficult to keep in the correct lane, and to keep the correct following distances."

# *Impairment*

### Drug involved driving a growing concern

- Rate of alcohol involvement in severe crashes dramatic fallen in past decade
- Repeat drink drivers and high-risk groups still high
- Rise in drug-involved crashes
- Alcohol and drug use increases severe traffic crash risk
- In New Zealand there has been a reduction in drink driving among youth since the lowering of the youth limit at low levels, but not for high BAC levels



## Restraints

#### A leading, but preventable, factor in road deaths

- One in 33 front seat occupants are unrestrained
- On in 14 rear seat passengers not wearing their seatbelt
- Child restraints used 93-95% of the time
- In 2019, non-use of restraints about 90 deaths
- Over half would have survived on average in their seat belt had been worn
- Strong relationships between substance impairment and not using a seat belt
